We have had two successful Cottage meetings so far this week with two more to follow next week.



Student Planner

The manufacturer of your children's planners produces some items for parents to consider as they help their child make good use of their planner. Here is an item that relates to what's in the planners over the coming fortnight:

To live a fulfilling and meaningful life, it is important for students to show other people matter by having the courage to apologise to others who they have upset or done the wrong thing by. Similarly, when the shoe is on the other foot, they need to be prepared to forgive others who have upset them. And, also it will benefit their own wellbeing when they forgive themselves for silly things they have done.

It is quite amazing how much emotional energy gets used up every day by people holding grudges. In some ways, this situation is quite understandable, because it takes a considerable amount of courage to open our hearts to say sorry or forgive others who have upset us. The issue can be that others may not be prepared to accept our apology and forgive us, and that's where courage comes in. Making the effort to at least try, will lift a load off our shoulders.

And to do this, students will have to use their character strengths to their fullest. While many students know about and talk about their strengths, they don't often use them. Apologising and forgiving are ideal opportunities for students and ourselves to consciously and deliberately practise using them. And from doing this comes personal growth.

Social Sciences

In Year 10 Social Studies, we have been learning about Māori life in NZ, prior to European arrival. We studied topics such as weapons, tools, tattoos, canoe/waka building and cannibalism. Māori used rope for many of their every day activities, so we used a double lesson with Māori to learn about the tikanga of harvesting and using harakeke (flax) and how to make rope from it. Thank you so much to Mrs Linklater for teaching us and to Phoebe for assisting with this.











Students in the Year 11 Commerce class have been working in groups to produce documentaries on the strategies that businesses use to encourage us to buy their products.



Currently in Year 11 and 12 Geography and History, it is a cacophony of doom and gloom. The Year 11's are looking at the effects a volcanic eruption in Auckland would have on the populous and economy. The Year 12's are looking at global spatial patterns of Covid-19 deaths, and how this affects people. Our Year 13 Geography students, on the other hand, are analysing the Mackenzie Highland Show. Our final year History students are looking at the lessons learned from the 1931 Napier Earthquake, in regards to the response to the 2011 Christchurch Earthquakes and it's continuing rebuild. As part of this unit the class spent a day in Christchurch.

Adverse Weather

This winter there is a chance that snow may affect the running of the school. All bus students have received a letter titled Adverse Weather Bus Procedures which details the school's response to severe weather such as snow and gale-force wind. Here is an outline of the school's response to adverse weather for all students of the College:

- 1. The school is notified by concerned citizens about road conditions in their area. Contact our Bus Controller, Michelle on 027 421 8900 or Principal, Jason on 027 329 8919. The earlier we get the information the better don't worry about waking us up!
- 2. If school is already in progress, a decision is made in consultation with all Fairlie schools and buses may be called in early.
- 3. Parents of bus students are immediately notified by the school office and by the phone tree. A message is also sent to parents of all students via SMS (text message), Facebook notifications and on the school website.
- 4. Bus students whose parents have been successfully contacted by the school office are released as each bus arrives.
- 5. Fairlie based students remain at school until the end of the school day unless collected by a caregiver.

Please note that no bus student will be sent home in adverse weather conditions unless specific permission has been obtained by a caregiver. Also, students can only be collected by a registered caregiver unless specific permission has been obtained for another person to pick them up. Students cannot give permission for other families to drive them home.

Please contact the office if you require a replacement copy of the Adverse Weather Bus Procedures and associated phone tree.

School closure before the start of the school day will be notified via phone tree (bus students only), SMS (text), Facebook, the College website and by radio (Breeze FM - 89.9FM or 92.3FM).
